Please have all entries labelled and placed on tables by 6:45 pm and pick-up by 8:30 pm.

Volunteers will assist you with your registration and entry tags.

Entries will be judged by an OHA qualified judge.

General Rules and Tips:

- All horticultural exhibits should be prepared at home.
- Use clear glass bottles or vases for flower specimens.
- All specimens in the <u>horticultural</u> classes must be grown by the exhibitor.
- Paper plates will be provided for fruit and vegetable entries.
- Foliage and floral material used in <u>design</u> classes can be "acquired"

from other sources.

- Make sure all entries have an entry tag and your name is tucked under.
- For info on how to prepare entries consult Ontario Judging and Exhibiting Standards (OJES 2019).
- Store your carrying boxes under tables.

For Horticultural Specimens:

- Classes 1 to 36 Specimens should be placed in a clear glass container with a small amount of water. Specimens should have their leaves attached.
- Classes 37 to 40 Specimens will be displayed on a white paper plate, which will be provided.

For Design Exhibits:

- One entry per class in design.
- Beginner exhibitors in design are those who has never won a first class ribbon in previous Manotick Horticultural Society Flower Shows.
- Advanced exhibitors in design are those who have received a first place in previous Manotick Horticultural Society Flower Shows.

Division 1 – Horticultural Specimen Classes

- Class 1 Allium, 1 stem
- Class 2 Clematis, 1 bloom, with own foliage attached
- Class 3 Hemerocallis (day lily), any variety, 1 scape
- Class 4 Iris (bearded), white, cream, or yellow self-colour, 1 scape
- Class 5 Iris (bearded), pink or red self-colour, 1 stalk
- Class 6 Iris (bearded), orange or bronze self-colour, 1 stalk
- Class 7 Iris (bearded), lavender or light blue self-colour, 1 stalk
- Class 8 Iris (bearded), purple or black self-colour, 1 stalk
- Class 9 Iris (bearded), bi-colour, (standards and falls contrasting colours), 1 stalk
- Class 10 Iris (bearded), bi-tone, (standards and falls differing tones of same colour), 1 stalk
- Class 11 Iris, Siberian, same variety, 3 stalks
- Class 12 Iris, any other variety or colour not mentioned above, 1 stalk
- Class 13 Lupine, 1 stem
- Class 14 Pansies (large flowered type), same variety, same colour, foliage attached, 3 stems
- Class 15 Papaver (Oriental poppy), 1 stem
- Class 16 Peony, single, Japanese or anemone, any colour, 1 bloom
- Class 17 Peony, semi-double, any colour, 1 bloom
- Class 18 Peony, double red, 1 bloom
- Class 19 Peony, double white, 1 bloom
- Class 20 Peony, double pink, 1 bloom
- Class 21 Peony, tree, 1 bloom
- Class 22 Peony, any other than above, 1 bloom
- * When showing peonies, please remove side buds and all but the uppermost leaves.

- Class 23 Rose hybrid tea, any cultivar, 1 specimen bloom, remove buds
- Class 24 Rose grandiflora, any cultivar, 1 specimen bloom or spray
- Class 25 Rose floribunda, any cultivar, 1 spray
- Class 26 Rose Modern shrub, any cultivar, 1 spray
- Class 27 Rose English or Austin, any cultivar, 1 bloom or spray
- Class 28 Rose Canadian rose (i.e., Explorer, Morden, Parkland, Artists series, etc.), 1 bloom or spray
- Class 29 Rose Miniature, 1 spray or specimen bloom
- Class 30 Rose Floating in a bowl, 1 bloom, no foliage
- Class 31 Rose Selected for Fragrance, 1 bloom
- * Try to name all rose entries, to improve the educational aspect of the show.
- Class 32 Violas (small flowered type), same variety, with own foliage attached, 3 stems
- Class 33 Collection of Perennials other than above, 3 kinds, 1 stem of each, named
- Class 34 Collection of Annuals, 3 kinds, 1 stem of each, in 1 container, named on index card
- Class 35 Collection of 5 Hosta leaves, different varieties in 1 container
- Class 36 Branch of a flowering shrub or tree, max. 36" above table, 1 branch
- Class 37 Perennial vegetable, 3 of a kind, on white paper plate
- Class 38 Annual vegetable, 3 of a kind, on white paper plate
- Class 39 Fruit, 3 of a kind, on white paper plate
- Class 40 Any other cultivar, other than above, 1 stem, bloom or spray

*Paper plates will be available.

Division 2 – Design Classes

"Grow it, then Show it"

- Class 41a **Woodland Scene** A design incorporating grapevine, a branch, bark, or a Bracket fungus. Design is to be no wider than 24 inches.
- Class 41b Same as above, but for advanced exhibitors
- Class 42a Time for Tea A small design in a teacup and saucer featuring garden flowers. Small design must be no larger than 10 inches in any direction.
- Class 42b Same as above, but for advanced exhibitors
- Class 43a **A Garden Shoe** A design in a garden shoe suitable for a BBQ picnic table. Design is to be no wider than 24 inches.
- Class 43b Same as above, but for advanced exhibitors
